Vancouver WP Retreat

at the Evan's Lake Forestry Resource Centre January 18^{th} - 20^{th} , 2002

...a personal experience, by Edmund Gin...

This year, in a move to save costs and ensure optimal participation, a series of winter Province Retreats were held instead of a summer Joint Province Convention. Owing to the fact that the only other chapter in the Province is just under a day's driving distance away, two separate Western Province Retreats were held: one near Vancouver, and one near Los Angeles. Sadly, I was unable to attend the one in California; however, I did attend the Province Retreat in BC. The following is a brief summary of my experience.

Our weekend started at the House: the bus picked us up there just as darkness was settling. The ladies of Alpha Omega Epsilon Engineering Sorority were invited, and many took up the invitation. Communications Director Brother Alix Minden also flew in from San Francisco to attend.

The bus ride took us only as far as the edge of the gravel road - the rest of the way was travelled on foot. After choosing bunkhouses and a brief lecture by the caretaker, an inter-cabin social broke out, and took over the rest of the night. Many new drinks were created that night, and many did not find their bunk bed until late (some later than others).

The next morning was filled with tutorials. Former Western Province Councillor Brother Kevin Oldknow led a discussion on the Object and the Code of Ethics of the Fraternity, as well as the corresponding Ideals and Objectives of AOE. This was followed by an introspective discussion on why we joined Sigma Phi Delta and the development of a written rush plan, both of which were conducted by current Western Province Councillor Brother Darren Farnworth. After a lunch of veggies and burgers (including a monster burger created by the Alumni Chapter Vice-President, Brother Jan Erik Laursen), and a wrap-up discussion early in the afternoon, the rest of the afternoon was occupied by a series of

"Capture the Beer" games (similar to "Capture the Flag", but with a twist).

The rest of the day consisted of a Casino Night. Various games of chance (and some of skill) were available for play that night. The highlight of the "Casino" was, by far, the Craps table, with much (Monopoly) money changing hands. The night ended with the takeover and attempted takeover of various tables by certain individuals, resulting in a consolidation and final ultimate takeover of the Craps table by one of the ladies of AOE.

After a morning of cleanup and inspections, we assembled for a series of group photos, and then we all hiked down the mile or so of slushy road. The weekend retreat ended with most of us going home exhausted, but all of us with fresh ideas in our heads.

Tau Lambda to be Theta Chapter Local at University of British Columbia to be Installed Latter Part of Month, Making Sigma Phi Delta International

...from the April 1932 edition of the Castle...

Early in January, 1929, Jack Cummings and Frank Gordon of Science '32 discussed the possibility of forming a local social engineering fraternity on the campus of the University of British Columbia. They interested 8 other men in the project and a meeting was held shortly afterwards, the following men being present: Kenneth Bews, Science '31; Steve Carre, Science '32; Ernie Carswell, Science '32; George Creighton, Science '32; Phil Emery, Science '32; Frank Gordon, Science '32; Max Green, Science '32; Verne Read, Science '32; Alan Webster, Science '32; Jack Cummings, Science '32.

The formation of such a fraternity was agreed upon and it was decided that the necessary steps be taken for its inauguration. A temporary executive was elected consisting of Max Green, Steve Carre and Jack Cummings. At a second meeting a constitution which had been drawn up during the interim was passed and the name Tau Lambda chosen. Official recognition was granted by the Interfraternity

Council on February 14, 1929. The first meeting of Tau Lambda Fraternity was held February 21, 1929, at which an executive was elected as follows: Jack Cummings, president; Max Green, Secretary; Steve Carre, treasurer; Ernie Carswell, interfraternity council representative.

Alan Webster submitted a design for the official badge which was accepted by the meeting. It was decided that Mr. A. B. Lighthall, professor of civil enginering at the university, be asked to accept the position of honourary president which he did. Regular weekly meetings were held during the remainder of the term, one new man being pledged, H. A. S. West, Science '32. The same executive was elected to carry on the next year.

Session of 1929-30 – During the session twelve men were initiated and two pledged. The question of a fraternity house was studied and one was rented into which the fraternity moved September, 1930. Social activities included a formal and informal party, as well as several banquets.

Session of 1930-31 – During this session the executive was: Henry Givins, president and interfraternity council representative; Art Saunders, vice-president and house manager; Robert Halet, secretary; Irving Smith, treasurer; Kenneth Bews, historian. The year opened with fourteen active members including seven in the house. Seven men were initiated and three pledged. The original policy of social engineering was maintained after considerable argument in favour of petitioning an international social.

Session of 1931-1932 – So far this year six men have been initiated and three pledged. The executive for this session is: A. J Saunders, president and interfraternity council representative; T. W. Somerton, vice-president and house manager; W. Wood, secretary; D. J. MacLaurin, treasurer; E. R. Carswell, historian; R. Wilson, corresponding secretary.

 $\Sigma\Phi\Delta$ embarked on a major fundraising drive in December 2001. The goal is to raise \$20,000 (US) for the Fraternity's important expansion and other programs.

The costs attendant to a viable expansion program add up quickly. For example, we will install our first non-North American Chapter this spring at Bangladesh University of Engineering and Technology. Flights for the initiating team (Grand President Derek Troy, Grand Vice President Keith Hileman, and Omega Brother Golam Bokhtier (the sponsor)) will take lots of bucks. Also, Keith and Brother Andy Hoshock just made a quick trip to Texas where there is intense interest in a $\Sigma\Phi\Delta$ Chapter at the University of Texas-Arlington. The immediacy of the issue precluded getting 21-day advanced booking tickets. And so it goes.

I placed a fundraising progress report in the spring Castle, which will be going to print next week, and it shows that of the chapters with alumni (not Psi or Omega), Theta's donations are second lowest of Active Chapters, at \$525 (Cdn). I doubt at that level of giving we could purchase a ticket from Vancouver to Victoria, let alone Bangladesh.

I hope the Alumni there will share more of their Country's newly found spirit of gold with the Fraternity, eh?
